Course Description

This one-day course is part of an initiative to promote prevention and early intervention for borderline personality disorder (BPD) across the health, education, welfare, and other relevant systems. GAP conferences are being organized nationally and internationally to increase awareness of and competence in treating young people with BPD. During this conference, leaders in the field of BPD will present on a range of topics, spanning neurobiology and course of BPD to evidence-based treatments for BPD in adolescents. Cutting edge research and practice will be distilled into presentations accessible to both professionals and lay audience members.

BPD has its onset in early adolescence and young adulthood yet diagnosis and treatment are commonly delayed. Early detection and intervention is key to offsetting the development of the disorder and yet the lack of training in early prevention and intervention marks a large practice gap in the field. This training will educate clinicians on the most updated information about BPD in young people and provide them with the tools to better serve their patients.

Target Audience

Physicians, psychiatric nurses, psychologists, social workers, licensed mental health counselors for credit; lay audience members not for credit.

Educational Objectives

This workshop will equip participants to:

1. Describe the assessment, diagnosis, course of BPD in young people
2. Recognize the role of epistemic trust in the development psychiatric risk
3. Summarize evidence-based treatments for adolescents with BPD including General Psychiatric Management and Mentalization-based treatment
4. Explain new developments in treatment and resources for families of young people with BPD
5. Describe recent updates in impulsivity, substance abuse, and self-harm in young people
